Formed by erosion caused by spring water, the Devil's Punch Bowl is a striking natural amphitheatre of open heathland that's home to wild ponies, deer and the likes of nightjars and stonechats. This walk meets a section of the old A3 that was replaced when the

Hindhead Tunnel was opened in 2011. It has since been turned into a trail that helps take you to the top of Gibbet Hill, from where there are views across the Weald and as far as London. The walk starts and finishes at the village of Thursley, which was the childhood home of Surrey's most famous architect, Edwin Lutyens. He lived at what is now called

Street House, by The Clump (a grassy triangle with benches). He is just as well known for his country house designs, many in Arts and Crafts style, as he is for his international commissions and for his war memorials, notably the Cenotaph in Whitehall, A number of Lutyens family graves are to be seen in the churchyard of St Michael & All Angels.

From The Clump in the middle of the village head along The Street and turn R into Highfield Lane up past the church for just over 1km to the top of the lane. Time looking round the church is well spent and in the churchyard is the famous Sailor's Grave. This is the grave of an unnamed man who was murdered in 1786 in Hindhead by three men whom he had met in a pub in the village. The three men were later arrested, convicted of murder and hanged in Guildford. Their corpses were hung in chains above the village on Gibbet Hill.

3³/₄ mile/1.2km Continue ahead onto the byway steadily uphill on the Greensand Way. This takes you up a holloway, over a byway

detour L to the top of Gibbet Hill, with its triangulation pillar and Celtic cross.

3²¹/₄ miles/3.7km The byway now levels out

and sweeps round past the Sailor Stone memorial. Here you are also passing above the Hindhead Tunnel through which the modern A3 now passes, but until this opened in 2011 the road passed over the top of the hill. In another 400m reach a bridleway iunction and turn R over the line of the 1822 coach road. which later became the A3. to the viewpoint overlooking the Punch Bowl. Here, there is a picnic area and National Trust café with toilets by the car park.


4 2³/₄ miles/4.3km Continue along the

bridleway (SP Highcombe) into woodland and down to a gate into the National Trust area of Highcombe Edge. Keep along the broad crest and after 400m. at a fork in the bridleway, keep R and descend for another 800m to reach a bridleway cross-paths. Head straight over and descend through a gate and then more steeply down a holloway to Hyde Lane.

4½ miles/7.4km **D** Turn R up the narrow lane past Ridgeway Farm, beyond which the lane becomes a byway and descends steeply to a

footbridge across a brook. Climb steeply up the far side past cottages to Highfield Lane once again. Here, turn L and retrace steps back down to Thursley.

Mature trees and woodland line parts of this route.
