

O3 WEST SUSSEX KINGLEY VALE & BOW HILL

Distance: 12.5km/7¾ miles Time: 3½ hours Grade: Moderate





CHOSEN BY... KEITH FOSKETT This walk is a circular adventure in the

South Downs National Park, visiting one of the oldest yew tree woods in the country at Kingley Vale. It takes in a delightful mix of open countryside, grassy meadows, ancient woodland, prehistoric earthworks and mysterious barrows. The lower slopes contain the best of the yews, whilst the upper reaches are perfect for admiring the autumn colour, and substantial views south to the English Channel and the Isle of Wight.

Start 1

From car park, head north on a wide, stony path through

fields. Continue through short section of woodland and on through fields, with Kingley Vale visible directly ahead. On the southern edge of the wood, turn L to go straight at first and then curve to the R. Keep along path at edge of woods, with trees to R and fields to L, with extensive views opening up to the south east. Continue to fork in path.

21.9km/1½ miles
Go R on path into the
woods – it becomes grassier
and open before entering
enclosed woodland. These
lower flanks are the best areas
to see the yew trees. Veer R as
path merges from L and keep
going to reach an open summit



32.8km/1¾ miles
With tumuli on R, follow grassy path north to enter woodland once more on a wide well defined track. A field




where the first of four ancient

opens on your L shortly before a junction. Bear slightly L downhill through broad leaf woodland. A wide track merges from the R as you bear L, and shortly after you'll reach a junction.

4 5.1km/3½ miles
Take a sharp R to head NE
on a well-defined, straight path
with woodlands to start and
then fields on L. Continue
1.3km to path crossroads,
to the S of Chilgrove village.

5.5km/4 miles
Turn sharp R and head
S through woodland. Carry
on straight at a small junction
(the L turn takes you to the
earthworks of Goosehill Camp).
Stay S on a straight path which
emerges at a trig point on Bow
Hill, just E of the Devil's Humps.

9.2km/5¾ miles
Bear R towards the
humps, keeping them to your
R, to rejoin your upward route.
Retrace steps back along the
S edge of woodland and across
fields back to car park.
