



## LANCASHIRE LEGEND

CHOSEN BY... DAVID MARSH Pendle Hill is both a prominent East Lancashire landmark and a much-loved outdoor resource. Its understandable popularity continues to grow with the numbers visiting the summit now almost double what they were before the pandemic. The majority of these visitors access the summit via the 'tourist path' on Pendle's eastern side. The route described here, however, tackles the hill from its less-frequented western side. Starting from the impossibly pretty village of Downham, where Whistle Down The Wind was filmed, it savours the wide-open expanses of Pendle's plateau with its views across the Ribble Valley to Bowland. It also visits Fox's Well named after George Fox, founder of the Quakers who quenched his thirst here after experiencing visions on the summit. The well's crystalclear waters, sampled via the attached tankard, make for fine refreshment on this, the connoisseur's way of sampling Pendle.

## Start

From car park walk back towards West Lane but take public footpath R just before reaching it. Go through gate and keep to R edge of following two fields before cutting across the third to the southern foot of Worsaw Hill. Keep to L of next field then drop L, passing barn, to cross stream and reach road.

## **3**<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile/1.3km

✓ Turn R along road and follow as it turns hard L. As road then bends R, continue straight on up tarmac track. When this turns L, continue ahead on public footpath to gate onto moorland. Turn R and ascend on R side of ravine. At top turn R and follow path as it crosses towards Burst Clough then ascends by a wall. The path turns R with wall then crosses to climb a slanting groove onto the plateau. As gradient eases take first path L to ascend to Scout Cairn.

## **7**2¼ miles/3.7km

Follow path NE to a large, circular wind shelter, beyond which is a new metal gate in wall. On the other side, follow path as it turns E to cross the plateau to another metal gate, meeting the popular path up from Pendle House. Turn R on reinforced path to the summit with its trig point.

## 3<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> miles/5.9km

Retrace steps from summit to go through metal gate. Turn R, descending by wall to meet path coming over wall stile. Turn L and follow path down to Fox's Well with metal cover.

## **4**¼ miles/6.7km


From well continue on thin path that contours around the steep slope to meet a broader, eroded path coming down from L. Descend on this and, after a pronounced zig-zag, head straight down across the boggy moorland to the road.

## C 5½ miles/8.7km

Cross road and follow footpath down steps, turning L at bottom. Go over stile and descend on R side of fields by wooded stream. Cross track by Clay House and continue on path by stream. Nearing Downham, the path swings L to run beside Downham Beck before entering the village. Join the main road, turn L over bridge and return to car park.
